## Recognising serious illness in your baby

This information is for families who have had a baby and leave hospital in less than 24 hours after the birth.

In this situation, it is important to observe your baby's behaviour and monitor baby for any signs of infection or being unwell.

Please use the table on the next page to record your observations (tick normal or abnormal) of the following:

- 1. Temperature: Measure the temperature in the arm pit, (normal temperature is 36.5- 37.5°C)
- 2. Breathing rate per minute: Count the breathing rate when your baby is settled, count for a full one minute (normal breathing rate is 40-60 per minute)
- 3. Signs of difficulty in breathing: Fast breathing (more than 60 per minute), working hard for breathing with indrawn ribs with breaths or noisy breathing/grunting)
- 4. Skin colour: Watch for any signs of baby's skin colour changing (becoming pale, white or less pink, or mottled)
- 5. Activity level: Check if baby is unusually drowsy (e.g. difficult to wake to feed, less active etc.) or seems unwell or cannot be settled

This should be done before each feed or at least every 6 hours until your baby is 48 hours old.

If the observations are abnormal, if your baby looks unwell or if you are concerned, please seek medical advice:
